Lent in the Parish

Praying the Gospel of Mark during Lent: based on *Meeting God in Mark* by Rowan Williams (SPCK). Individually, we can pray a few verses each day.

Here is Week 4: Monday to 4th Sunday of Lent – Mon: 7:24-37; Tues: Mk 8:1-21; Wed: Mk 8:22-9:1; Thurs: Mk 9:2-29; Fri: 9:30-50; Sat: Mk 10:1-16. The following Reflection is given for the 4th Sunday of Lent: The stakes seem to grow higher as Jesus gets deeper into his public ministry. He seems to get easily frustrated, dismissing a Syro-Phoenician woman who asks for help and walking away from Pharisees who ask for a sign. He shames disciples who don't seem to 'get it', but sternly orders those who do proclaim his identity to keep quiet about it.

Combined with Jesus' discussion of his coming death, bold display on the mountain top, and affirmation of those outside the disciples' circle, what do you think is behind Jesus' attitude in these chapters? Why do you think Mark portrayed Jesus this way, even if his writing would make readers confused by or concerned about Jesus?

God, help me to walk in Jesus' shoes and experience the world through his eyes as we approach the time of his trial and death. Amen.

Synod – Moving Forward

At the heart of our meetings before Christmas was prayer, centred on the Word of God. We began to discern where we felt the Holy Spirit was calling us, as a parish. There were three main areas which emerged:

- Being a parish community, which welcomes and cares
- Being a parish community, which prays & worships
- Being a parish community, which reaches out

Our next step is to move from discernment to action. Whatever we do as a parish needs to be achievable. Our parish and Christian life should not be burdensome. Rather, it should be life giving. We will seek to identify one or two concrete things in each of the areas we can do, which will give life and hope. We'll also ask how we can move this forward, considering the practical need of getting organised as we grow and develop as a parish community.

Our next Parish Synod Gatherings are this week: on Monday 4 March (7-9pm) or Saturday 9 March (10am-12noon)

Not everyone will be able or will wish to be involved with meetings. That is understandable and those who attend are no more important than anyone else. We are simply trying to identify ways to move forward as a parish community which will be lifegiving to our parish and hopefully to our local community in Deal, too. (If you are unlikely to come to the meeting, please feel free to drop a note to the presbytery, or an email, with any thoughts about the three areas.)

Journeying Together in Deal

During October we hosted two Synod meetings in the parish, with a further meeting on 2nd December to consider our parish priorities for 2024. We shared our faith together, beginning with the Word of God, and then using the 'Conversation in the Spirit' method of discernment. This way of sharing encourages everyone to discern the presence of the Holy Spirit within the conversation. This is a short overview of the fruits of these meetings.

October Gatherings

We shared on the Sunday Gospel, considering the commandment of Jesus to love God and love neighbour. We then had 'conversations in the Spirit' on the following questions:

- **How do you experience the Church community journeying together? (When does this bring joy? When might it bring pain or sadness?)**
- **What might the Holy Spirit be inviting us to do, in our steps to become a parish community 'journeying together' in Deal?**

The sharing from each group helped to distil the following areas which we felt the Holy Spirit was inviting us to consider as a parish:

- Building our Parish Community
- Listening & Sharing our faith together
- Centrality of the Eucharist
- Prayer
- Engaging with young people
- Outreach to the local community
- Relationships with other Christian denominations and other faiths

December Meeting

We reminded ourselves in December that the purpose of synodal meetings is "to inspire people to dream about the Church we are called to be, to make hopes flourish, to stimulate trust, to bind up wounds, to weave new and deeper relationships, to learn from one another, to build bridges, to enlighten minds, warm hearts and restore strength to our hands for our common mission." (Vatican Synod Document).

Again, we began by sharing faith centered on Scripture. We shared on the Sunday reading from St Paul, reflecting on the gifts of the Spirit which have been given to us, and our reliance on the steadfastness and faithfulness of God. This provided the foundation for us to continue our conversations in the Spirit and consider the fruits of the last meetings (above). We asked:

- **Reflecting on your own experience, how do the 'areas' above strike you?**
- **Are there other 'areas' of parish life we should be considering?**
- **What might the Holy Spirit be saying to us today?**

Several common themes emerged. Prayer was seen as a unifying theme for many, with the importance of the parish as a praying community, both individually and collectively. Prayer will enable us to face the challenges of our times, and also to become a truly welcoming parish, where we see others as people first and foremost, transcending any difficulties or obstacles to being inclusive.

The theme of welcome was shared by many others. Some people shared that there has been hurt in the parish in recent years, and have not felt welcome, and that that hurt will take time to heal. The Eucharist remains the centre – the source and the summit – and hence our source of strength and means of healing and unity.

Several groups spoke of the Indian community now visible in Deal and within our worshipping community. How are we welcoming them, and how are we celebrating and promoting the participation of the riches they will bring to the parish?

There is currently an exciting feeling of renewal in the Parish, partly inspired by this synodal process, and there is hope that something is happening. Meeting and sharing will be a source of healing of remaining hurt in the parish.

In fact, the experience of meeting, listening, sharing and praying was appreciated by a large proportion of those present, and there was a strong desire to continue. One group described it as a sign of 'blossoming' and that we are on the right track and should keep going, grasping the opportune moment which we have as a parish.

They felt that we can rely on God's faithfulness to enable us to be steadfast in our commitment to all the areas of parish life we are discerning. Prayer and liturgy will be central, but so will our response to the Christian call to 'service' to the wider community.

This links to the sharing of one group who spoke about evangelizing from within the parish, as a foundation for reaching out. We need to be a prayerful community, building up the body of the parish (and in dialogue and relationship with other Christians and other faiths), so we can spread outwards to others, including our own loved ones who may not be practicing.

We then committed to develop concrete ideas for moving forward. We shared together on the following:

- **What are the dreams/possibilities for you individually, and for the parish?**
- **In what ways has the Lord enriched us, individually and as a parish, to help develop these dreams?**
- **Are there any specific things which the Spirit might be inviting us to do, in our steps to develop our parish life?**

The sharing which followed pointed towards a common discernment in the Spirit. We felt the Holy Spirit was inviting us to continue the listening, sharing and discerning, and to building on the fruits in three main areas:

A parish community which welcomes and cares

- Keeping the scripture sharing and synodal meetings going as a means of developing community
- Those who attend these synod meetings are no more holy than others! We recognise people are busy, and that some people will choose to engage with parish life in other ways.
- Looking after one another – as a sign to others of our love. Service through action– and a willingness to be available to the parish community (driving, cooking etc.)
- Using our buildings well, to build community
- Developing good communication with one another

A parish community which prays & worships:

- Prayer groups
- Spiritual book library
- Formation on the Mass
- Initiatives to enrich the Mass going community – e.g. An 'everyone brings someone' Sunday.

A parish community which reaches out:

- Developing activities to have a greater presence in Deal
- Reestablishing the SVP
- Church open more often
- Warm buildings to welcome people – will require money and commitment (time, treasure, talent).
